

College Credit Plus

College Credit Plus (CC+) allows students in grades 7-12 to take college courses and earn both high school and college credit. The grades and credits earned appear on both the student's high school and college transcripts. Students can earn up to 30 credits per year. (Maximum of 120 credit hours total.)

Where can students take courses?

Eligible students can take courses at the high school taught by a high school teacher, at the high school taught by a college instructor or at the college (online or live). Students may choose to take courses in any combination of formats or with any combination of Ohio colleges. Please be aware that no matter where the course is offered (at the college campus, online or at Worthington High Schools), the course will follow the same college course syllabus, use the same textbook, and be assessed using the same methods and grading standards.

What does it cost?

There is no cost for the student to participate in College Credit Plus when the student is enrolled in a public college or university. The high school and college share the cost for these course(s). Students choosing to enroll in a participating private college or university might incur costs. If a student fails a course and/or withdraws after the 100% refund deadline, the school district will bill the family for the cost of the course(s). Economically disadvantaged students will not incur any costs associated with college credit plus.

When can I participate?

Students can take classes during the summer, fall or spring semesters or any combination of terms provided that the student does not exceed 30 hours in that academic year (beginning with summer term). It is important to meet all college deadlines in order to participate.

What classes can I take?

Students may take most non-remedial courses offered in the college's course catalog for which the student has met the prerequisites. Course options include traditional courses and online courses. The courses offered in Worthington are listed on the high school course selection sheets.

Prior to registering for any CC+ courses, students are encouraged to investigate how the credits will transfer to their future anticipated college. Many entry-level courses earned at Ohio public colleges are guaranteed to transfer to any other Ohio public college. Students who wish to earn credits at a private college or those who want to transfer credits to an out-of-state institution will need to have their CC+ transcripts evaluated on a case-by-case basis by the institution they are seeking to attend.

To determine the number of college credits a student can earn in an academic school year, take the number of classes scheduled at the high school for which the student will receive only high school credit, multiply that number by 3 and then subtract the result from 30. The resulting number shall be the total number of college credits a student participant may earn under CC+ in an academic year.

How do CC+ grades work?

The grades are calculated based upon the college's standard and assigned by the college instructor. CC+ grades will be transferred into the Worthington transcript and grade point average. All CC+ classes are

weighted at the same standing as AP/ IB courses in the same subject area. If there is not an AP/ IB course in the subject area the college class would not be weighted.

I want to participate, so what do I do next?

1. Submit the written notice of intent to participate for the following school year between February 15 and April 1.
2. Select the CC+ classes you intend to take during the course registration process.
3. Apply to the college(s) of choice. Please be aware that colleges will have different deadlines for various terms and students must apply prior to the deadline for their intended college(s).
4. Upon acceptance to the college(s), complete testing requirements to assure placement into your intended courses. If you are not accepted or do not place into your intended courses, you must immediately notify your counselor and select alternate courses for your schedule.
5. Follow through with completing any requirements established by the college.
6. Check school email regularly for CC+ updates/ announcements.
7. Please note, the college textbooks will be purchased by the Worthington School District and will remain the property of Worthington Schools. Students are responsible for following established guidelines for obtaining and returning college textbooks (these guidelines will vary by individual college). Failure to follow the procedure and return the textbooks will result in the student being responsible for the cost of the textbook.
